1.	Brief description of the	<i>The course deals with various aspects of the Swedish</i>

	course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<p><i>language. The structure of language at different levels is studied through the analysis of words, phrases, sentences and texts. Social and geographical variation and change are studied, and spoken and written texts from various periods and genres are analysed. The course provides the students with training in communicating in a persuasive and efficient manner, in both speech and writing.</i></p> <p><i>The course consists of four sub-courses:</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <i>1. Contemporary Swedish, 7.5 credits,</i> <i>2. The Structure of the Swedish Language, 7.5 credits,</i> <i>3. Textual Knowledge and Textual Analysis, 7.5 credits,</i> <i>4. The Art of Speaking, Writing and Persuasion, 7.5 credits.</i>

1.	Teaching methods employed including details of any compulsory components	<i>Teaching consists of exercises, lectures, tutoring and seminars. Obligatory, assessed seminars may be included in the sub-courses.</i>
