1.	Brief description of the course and its content	<i>The course comprises Swedish history of language and style from the era of runic inscriptions to the present day. It</i>

	including details of any sub-divisions	<i>discusses language change and various methods of explaining it. A number of works in historical linguistics that apply various theoretical approaches are studied and discussed with a focus placed on both content and method. The student reads a wide selection of early texts, and develops his/her ability to characterise their language in both a comprehensive and coherent manner.</i>
