Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	Through the study of different grammatical models and the comparison of different grammars, the course provides the student with in-depth knowledge of German syntax. Written proficiency is practised through the translation of Swedish into German, and by focusing on particular areas of difficulty. The course also provides an overview of the history of the German language and an in-depth study of, and wider contact with, early German literature. In the writing of a linguistics or literary degree essay, the student practises his/her ability to work in an independent and scholarly manner. The course consists of the following four sub-courses: 1. Written Proficiency, 7.5 credits 2. German Linguistics, 4.5 credits 3. History of the German Language, 3 credits 4. Degree Essay, 15 credits
