1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<i>The course allows students to deepen their knowledge and understanding of the grammar and vocabulary of Yiddish and their ability to translate between Yiddish and Swedish. In addition, students train their oral proficiency in Yiddish. The course also aims for students to become familiar with texts from various eras, in both Yiddish and in translation.</i>
