Decision

The programme syllabus is established by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology 29-05-2013 to be valid from 29-05-2013, autumn semester 2013.

Programme description

The MA in European Studies (MAPES) is a two-year interdisciplinary programme taught in English. The programme is aimed at students who are interested in a broad humanist approach to an understanding of Europe and who would like to work with communication and cultural issues in a European context in the future.

MAPES has a firm basis in research and theory. The programme provides students with theoretical and methodological tools for analysing present-day issues in Europe. Such issues include the social construction of identity, the growth of transnational communication, the interrelationship between culture and the increased cross-boundary mobility of people, and the relationship between various democratic values such as freedom of expression and religious freedom.

In addition, MAPES provides students with practical skills that will benefit their future careers. A specially designed course, focusing on the working methods and communication strategies of European institutions, acquaints students with different approaches and enables them to develop skills in project management and communication. Furthermore, opportunities for work placements with potential future employers are provided.

MAPES is introduced by a course worth 15 credits on historical, cultural and normative perspectives on Europe. Among the subjects taught on the course are the influence of Christianity on Europe, the concept of the nation-state, the ideas of the Enlightenment and of humanism, the view of the individual and his or her freedom and rights, and the significance and interrelationship of different democratic values, such as freedom of expression, tolerance and equality before the law. The following course, also worth 15 credits, provides students with an in-depth understanding of the political institutions and processes that have shaped and are shaping the European project. A special focus is placed on the European Union and on integration theories that explain the post-war development. The second semester starts with a course (15 credits) on relevant methods and theories for humanities-oriented European studies leading on to a stage where students develop various practical skills, first through a course on project management and communication (15 credits) and then through a work placement in the third semester, worth either 30 or 15 credits. An alternative to work placement is a range of elective courses, providing students with opportunities for specialisation and in-depth study. The final semester is devoted to the master's thesis (30 credits), in which students are to exhibit the knowledge and skills acquired during the programme of study.

The MA in European Studies opens up career opportunities in European institutions, embassies and businesses such as publishing houses, translation agencies and media companies which target a European audience or engage in intercultural communication. Further possibilities are in project management (especially for projects with EU funding) and in various public institutions and NGOs.

Goals

On completion of the programme, students shall

Knowledge and understanding

- demonstrate an advanced understanding of interdisciplinary theories and methods of relevance for analysing, explaining and critically examining Europe as a field of study;
- demonstrate substantially specialised knowledge of the European integration process, with an emphasis on cultural and social aspects; of the institutions of the EU in a historical and present-day context; and of other governmental and non-governmental players on the arena of European politics and public life;
- demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the general principles of project management and of how these can be applied in a European context;
- demonstrate specialised insight into current research and development work in European studies;
- informed by specialised theoretical and methodological knowledge, demonstrate the ability to independently identify important issues and, adopting an interdisciplinary approach, formulate and analyse complex questions of relevance to European studies, such as collective memories and identities, cultural and political integration, symbolic representation and communication.

Competence and skills

- demonstrate the ability to systematically and critically formulate, analyse and assess different complex issues and phenomena of relevance for European

- studies;
- demonstrate the ability to autonomously, creatively and scientifically plan and, using appropriate methods, undertake advanced tasks within predetermined time frames and so contribute to the formation of knowledge in European Studies as well as the ability to evaluate this work;
 - demonstrate the ability in speech and writing to report clearly and in a professional manner and discuss his or her conclusions and the arguments on which they are based in dialogue with different individuals or groups;
 - possess fundamental skills in project management.

Judgement and approach

- visa förmåga att göra självständiga bedömningar inom ämnet Europastudier, med hänvisning till relevanta vetenskapliga, sociala och etiska aspekter samt visa medvetenhet om etiska aspekter på forsknings- och utvecklingsarbete;

In consultation with the course coordinator and/or study advisor, the students can select courses in the humanities or social sciences which are relevant to their studies, 15 credits.

Progressive specialisation in the main field:

The progressive specialisation in the programme is reflected in the admission requirements for each course. Broad admission requirements are applied to the courses in the first semester (EUH R11 and R12), in which the aim is to familiarise students, irrespective of background, with key concepts and theories. Subsequently, the admission requirements are raised for each semester. For admission to the courses in semester 2, students must have passed at least one of the courses in semester 1 and submitted exams in both courses. For admission to the courses in semester 3, students must have passed 75 per cent of the credits from the previous two

semesters. For admission to the final degree project course (EUH R18), students must have passed 90 credits (including all compulsory courses) before they will be allowed to defend their thesis.

Requirements and Selection method

Requirements

To be admitted to the programme, applicants must have a Bachelor's degree in the humanities or social sciences, or the equivalent. The overriding criterion for admission is the applicant's ability to profit from the programme.

The following criteria for selection, in the order stated, will be applied to students who meet the admission requirements:

1. Oral and written proficiency in English. Skills in English can be documented in the following ways: IELTS test with an average score of 6.0 and no section scoring less than 5.5; TOEFL test with a minimum result of 550 (computer-based test 213, internet-based 79); Cambridge/Oxford - Advanced or Proficiency level; O level/GCSE; a Bachelor's degree from a university where English is the only language of instruction according to the most recent edition of the Handbook of Universities; or a pass in English B from Swedish upper secondary school.
2. Passes on courses of relevance to the programme. Certificates in the original, translated into English when necessary, from first-cycle courses are to be included in the application.
3. A letter of intent, of no more than 500 words, in which the applicant describes, in English, his or her qualifications, academic and career ambitions and explain why these make him or her suitable as a candidate for MAPES;
4. Two letters of recommendation from persons who are knowledgeable about the applicant's academic ability and are in the position to assess his or her skills. The letters must be written in English.
5. Interview (where necessary)

Selection method

Based on grades on previous courses, letter of intent, and 2 letters of recommendation.
