Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	Students on this course read approximately 60 pages of Arabic newspaper texts as well as texts with a focus on everyday situations and Arab culture with a gradually increasing vocabulary (approx. 3,000 words). The texts are analysed with particular regard to grammar, vocabulary and practical language proficiency. The course provides the students with active training in their ability to understand and use Arabic in various contexts and to read and write texts of a varying nature, in which grammar exercises are applied. The course offers further active training in the reading of and listening to Arabic in the mass media via radio/television and/or the internet and to communicate in moderately difficult everyday situations.
		The course consists of the following sub-courses: 1. Arabic Media I & II, 15 credits, 2. Communicative Arabic, III & IV, 15 credits.
