3.	Type of course and its place in the educational system	<i>The course is offered as a single course. It can normally be included as part of a general degree at the undergraduate or graduate levels. With the approval of the relevant authenticating body, it can also be included in certain professional degrees.</i>
4.	Language of instruction	<i>The course is normally taught in Swedish and Arabic, but if both the students and the lecturer agree, it may be taught in English and Arabic.</i>

1.	Knowledge and understanding	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>demonstrate sound knowledge of modern standard Arabic by formally and, with regard to content, analysing texts from Arabic newspapers, with focus on events concerning the Arab world.</i></li> </ul>
2.	Skills and abilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>be able to read and understand newspaper items and simple newspaper articles in Arabic</i></li> <li><i>be able to translate short newspaper items into Arabic.</i></li> </ul>

<b>4.</b>	<b>Course Content</b>	
1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<i>Students read approximately 30 pages of Arabic newspaper texts on this course. The texts are analysed with particular regard to grammar, vocabulary and practical language proficiency. The course focuses on newspaper texts from Arabic newspapers demanding a vocabulary of 2,000 words. The course offers further active training in the reading of and listening to Arabic in the mass media via radio/television and/or via the internet. The use of Arabic dictionaries is practiced.</i>

1.	Teaching methods employed including details of any compulsory components	<i>Teaching consists of lectures and obligatory exercises.</i>
2.	Examination details	<i>Examination takes the form of an oral and written examination at the end of the course.</i>
