3.	Type of course and its place in the educational system	<i>The course is offered as a single course. It can normally be included as part of a general degree at the undergraduate or graduate levels. With the approval of the relevant authenticating body, it can also be included in certain professional degrees.</i>
4.	Language of instruction	<i>The course is normally taught in Swedish and Arabic, but if both the students and the lecturer agree, it may be taught in English and Arabic. Such an agreement depends on both the lecturer and the students having a good command of English.</i>

1.	Knowledge and understanding	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>demonstrate in-depth knowledge and understanding of modern standard Arabic by analysing texts from Arabic newspapers formally and with regard to content, and with a focus on events concerning the Arab world.</i>

Skills and abilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>be able to read and understand newspaper articles of moderate difficulty in Arabic</i> <i>be able to translate simple newspaper texts into Arabic with the help of an active vocabulary of 2,500 words</i> <i>be able to execute satisfactory translations into Arabic of political mass media-style terminology which is found in news reports</i> <i>be able to understand newscasts without any great difficulty</i> <i>demonstrate a sound ability to communicate both orally and in writing.</i>
3.	Critical judgement and evaluation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <i>be able to discuss Arab culture and values from a linguistic perspective</i> <i>be able to discuss contemporary issues in the Arab world that are related to gender and ethnicity, from different standpoints.</i>

4.	Course Content	
1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<i>Students read approximately 30 pages of Arabic newspaper texts on this course. The texts are analysed with particular regard to grammar, vocabulary and practical language proficiency. The course offers further active training in the reading of and listening to Arabic in the mass media via radio/television and/or the internet with the aim of building up the vocabulary of students to 2,500 words.</i>

1.	Teaching methods employed including details of any compulsory components	<i>Teaching consists of lectures and obligatory exercises.</i>
