3.	Type of course and its place in the educational system	<i>The course is offered as a single course and can normally be included as part of a general degree at the undergraduate or graduate levels. With the approval of the relevant authenticating body, it can also be included in certain professional degrees.</i>
4.	Language of instruction	<i>The course is normally taught in Swedish and Arabic, but if the students and the lecture agree, it may be taught in English and Arabic. Such an agreement depends on both the lecturer and the students having a good command of English.</i>

1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<i>The course examines the development of the Arabic novel and short story during the 20th century. Emphasis is on the period post World War II. The goals of the course are reached through the reading and discussion of various representative</i>

		<i>novels – in whole or in part – and short story collections as well as other works in literary history. The works are studied from literary and linguistic viewpoints with particular attention being paid to their historical and social characteristics, and also their artistic qualities. Literature written by women is emphasised.</i>
