2.	Subject (if applicable)	<i>Hebrew</i>
3.	Type of course and its place in the educational system	<i>The course is offered as a single course. It can normally be included as part of a general degree at the undergraduate or graduate levels. With the approval of the relevant authenticating body, it can also be included in certain professional degrees.</i>
4.	Language of instruction	<i>The course is normally taught in Swedish and Hebrew, but if both the students and lecturer agree, it may be taught in English and Hebrew. Such an agreement depends on both the lecturer and the students having a good command of English.</i>

		On completion of the course the student shall
1.	Knowledge and understanding	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>be able to give an account of the most fundamental features in the verb system in Hebrew by discerning specific verb forms/patterns from the appearance of their stem forms</i></li> <li><i>be able to understand current, simple newspaper texts and thereby gain a command over a wider vocabulary in Hebrew.</i></li> </ul>
2.	Skills and abilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>be able to write and present autonomously in Hebrew a short text on a chosen subject</i></li> <li><i>be able to partake in simple conversations in Hebrew concerning everyday situations.</i></li> </ul>
3.	Critical judgement and evaluation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>through improved reading comprehension, be able to search for and relate to phenomena and relations in Israeli society such as issues concerning, for example, gender, ethnicity and cultural encounters, in an autonomous manner.</i></li> </ul>

1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any	<i>The study of modern Hebrew is based on the spoken and written language, Ivrit, which is the official language of the state of Israel.</i>

	sub-divisions	<p><i>The course is a continuation of HEB A01, and widens students' knowledge of the grammar and vocabulary of modern Hebrew. The course includes studying both newspaper texts in simple Hebrew, and more extensive texts. Film and other media are included as are practice in speaking and writing, simple conversation, role-play and oral presentations.</i></p> <p><i>The course consists of the following sub-courses:</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li><i>1. Grammar and Reading Comprehension, 7.5 credits,</i></li> <li><i>2. Oral and Written Proficiency, 7.5 credits.</i></li> </ol>
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<b>5.</b>	<b>Teaching and Assessment</b>	
1.	Teaching methods employed including details of any compulsory components	<i>Teaching consists of exercises and lectures. An obligatory, assessed oral presentation and the writing of a maximum of five obligatory, simple texts are included in sub-course 2.</i>
2.	Examination details	<i>The following examination forms may occur: Oral and written examination at the end of the sub-courses.</i>

<b>6.</b>	<b>Grades</b>	
1.	Grades	<i>Students are awarded one of the following grades: Fail, Pass or Pass with Distinction.</i>
2.	Grading of the complete course	<i>To be awarded a Pass on the whole course the student shall have at least the grade of Pass on both sub-courses. To be awarded the grade of Pass with Distinction on the whole course the student shall have the grade of Pass with Distinction on at least 10.5 of the credits on the course and at least a grade of Pass on the remaining credits.</i>
3.	Availability of supplementary ECTS grades	<i>Foreign students and Swedish students intending to use their qualifications abroad have the right to a supplementary ECTS grading. Students must request such a grading at the latest three weeks from the start of the course. This request is made to the subject coordinator or the equivalent authority.</i>
4.	Sub-courses and variations in grading (if applicable)	<i>Only the grades Fail and Pass can be awarded for the oral examination in sub-course 2.</i>
