The course includes a number of elements in which students carry out individual small scale research projects involving, among other topics, field studies of native speakers of other languages, studies of children's language learning and an oral presentation of a poster presenting a linguistic topic chosen by the student.
		The course consists of the following sub-courses: 1. The Structure and Function of Language, 7.5 credits, 2. Spoken Communication – the basis of phonetics, 7.5 credits 3. Language Learning Among Children and Adults, 7.5 credits, 4. Languages of the World, 7.5 credits.
