This involves a study of the language structure of both old and modern Icelandic. The student reads and translates both contemporary and early texts, and writes texts in simple modern Icelandic. In addition, various aspects of Iceland s history and culture are discussed, including literature. The course consists of four sub-courses: 1. An Introduction to Icelandic, 7.5 credits, 2. Modern Icelandic, 7.5 credits, 3. Old Icelandic, 7.5 credits, 4. Iceland: History, Language, Culture, 7.5 credits.
