Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<p><i>The course includes literature studied both in the original language and in translation, and the history of the Greek language. In addition, the course includes an independently executed study which is presented as a degree essay.</i></p> <p><i>The course consists of the following three sub-courses:</i></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <i>1. Modern Greek and Byzantine Literature, 7.5 credits</i> <i>2. The History of the Greek Language and Diglossia in Greece, 7.5 credits</i> <i>3. Degree Essay, 15 credits</i>
