4. Course Content		
1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<i>The student further develops his/her oral and written proficiency. Swedish grammar and the Swedish phonetic system are further discussed parallel to training in proficiency. The student's oral proficiency and listening comprehension skills are practised by partaking in debates and discussions. Written proficiency and knowledge of the stylistic variation of the Swedish language are practised by utilising specialist texts and text analysis. An active vocabulary is accrued through the reading of texts from, for</i>

		<i>example, contemporary Swedish literature. Pronunciation and grammar are practised using, among other methods, computer-based programmes in the language laboratory.</i>
