1.	Brief description of the course and its content including details of any sub-divisions	<i>The course consists of teaching and practical exercises in Swedish language proficiency. Students acquire knowledge of everyday phrases and vocabulary so as to be able to communicate in simple situations. Students also gain insights into Swedish grammar. Exercises in pronunciation are an important element of the course as is providing students with information on studying and living in Sweden.</i>
